### HERBICIDE USE IN NATURAL VEGETATION

A seminar presented by the Weed Society of Victoria

Thursday 20 February 2003 Chair: Greg Wells, Dow AgroSciences Venue: Engineering Lecture Theatre E2, Monash University, Clayton

Herbicide use in native vegetation is a tricky issue. Limited product registrations and lack of information about their environmental safety has meant herbicide use is fraught with risks. This seminar will examine issues such as legal use of herbicides, clarity of labels, research projects to examine herbicide use in native vegetation and practical experiences from forestry, pasture and industrial uses. It will also highlight the initiatives of some industries, such as forestry, to reduce herbicide use and identify safer alternatives. This seminar will provide valuable information and points of contact for anyone that has had to apply herbicides in off-label uses. It will be a great forum for meeting and swapping ideas and experiences.

If you are involved in parks management, work for Local Government, belong to a 'Friends of' or a Landcare Group, a manager of water quality, an industry representative with farmer or environmentally-minded clients, a contractor, an advisor, or just interested in weeds, then this seminar will be of immense interest to you.

## **Plant Conservation National Conference**

Recovery: A Decade Towards a Biodiverse Future

Fifth Australian Network for Plant Conservation National Conference and Conservation Techniques Workshops

Monday 24 February to Saturday 1 March 2003 • Geelong Conference Centre, Victoria, Australia

This 5th conference heralds in the next decade of development of the Australian Network for Plant Conservation (ANPC) in delivering on the charter to conserve and promote plant life in Australia. The challenges for plant conservation into the next decade are many. Society is now realising that environmental impacts are reaching to the very heart of the day to day lives of all Australians. We face issues such as the salinization of the Murray-Darling, global warming and extinction of species, and the pace of change is now eclipsing many of the earlier predictions on the level and scale of environmental change.

Ten years ago the ANPC was one of the first organisations to realise that conservation of species was paramount if Australia was to avoid a biodiversity meltdown. Today the work of the organisation in partnership with a host of other conservation-based organisations is delivering conservation benefits across a broad front of activities.

These activities have expanded from the simple species by species approach of the past to ecosystem functional approaches and multi-species conservation. This 5th conference of the ANPC represents a key point in scene setting for conservation activities by canvassing leading edge techniques and principles in plant conservation. The conference continues to present a major forum for conservation practitioners, community members and the scientific community to interact at a practical level. I encourage you to consider this conference if you believe more can be done for plant conservation. The theme of the conference represents a bold and enlightened view that change is happening but more needs to be done. To be an effective conservation practitioner I urge you to participate in this important conference and look forward to meeting you all in Geelong in February.

## Feral olives in South Australia

Feral olives (*Olea europaea* ssp. *europaea*) invading native vegetation in SA are the F1 (and later generation) offspring of cultivars bred for oil production and table olives.

Olives were first introduced to SA in 1836; five selected cultivars from Marseilles were imported by the South Australian Company in 1844, and later from Portugal, Spain, Provence and northern Italy. Because climate and soils in parts of SA resemble these areas, they readily become naturalised. The feral olives in SA are regarded as a source of valuable germplasm by plant breeders at Adelaide University, who have been able to trace their connection with old cultivars. The ferals may include trees with desirable recombinations of characters from these cultivars.

Compared to other tree crops, not much selective breeding has been done on olives. The cultivars seem to be heterozygous clones selected from spontaneous, uncontrolled crosses or at most a few generations removed from wild forms. The cultivars can be competitively equal to the original wild forms: in southern Europe and the Levant, ferals and crosses with cultivars have largely replaced the original wild *O. europaea* strains.

# **WSV** Constitution

#### 1. NAME

The name of the Society shall be 'The Weed Society of Victoria'.

#### 2. OBJECTS

The objects for which the Society is established are:

- a. To promote wider interest in weeds and their control.
- b. To provide opportunities for those interested in weeds and their control, to exchange information and ideas based on research and practice.
- c. To encourage the investigation of all aspects of weeds and weed control.
- d. To co-operate and, where appropriate, affiliate with other organizations engaged in related activities in Australia and overseas.
- e. To encourage the study of weed science and the dissemination of its findings.
- f. To produce and publish such material as considered desirable.
- g. To foster the development of an Australia-wide Weeds Organization.

#### 3. MEMBERSHIP

- a. Membership shall be of three classes 'ordinary', 'honorary' and 'corporate body', and shall be open to those individuals and corporate bodies respectively who are interested in weeds.
- b. Honorary members may be elected from persons who, in the opinion of the Executive Committee have made major contributions to the objects of the Society and shall have the same rights as ordinary members.
- c. Corporate body members may nominate one representative to the Society who shall have the same rights as an ordinary member.
- d. Applications for membership shall be considered by the Executive Committee and any person or corporate body who is approved by resolution passed by two-thirds majority as being suitable for election shall be regarded as a member.
- e. Any member wishing to withdraw from the Society shall give written notice to the Honorary Secretary on or before 31st December of the then current year. The resignation of such member shall be accepted upon receipt of such notice provided all subscriptions and dues have been paid by the member up to the end of the financial year.

#### 4. SUBSCRIPTIONS

Each ordinary member and each corporate body member shall pay an entrance fee and thenceforth an annual subscription which shall be fixed at the Annual General Meeting for the current year. The subscription shall be payable annually and shall fall due on the first day of March. In the event of the subscription being one year in arrears membership shall lapse. Before any person can be re-elected to membership all arrears in subscription shall be paid.

#### 5. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

- a. The Executive Committee shall consist of a President, the Immediate Past President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Publicity Officer and four other members the Society.
- b. The management of the Society shall be vested in the Executive Committee.
- c. Other than the Immediate Past President the members of the Executive Committee shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting. They shall be eligible for reselection except that the office of President shall not be held by any one person for more than two consecutive terms.
- d. The Executive Committee shall have the power to fill a casual vacancy in its membership.
- e. The Executive Committee shall have the power to co-opt members for specific purposes.
- f. A quorum for the executive committee shall be five (5).

#### 6. MEETINGS

The Executive Committee shall convene and hold an Annual General Meeting not later than the first day of March each year and such other meetings as it may consider necessary. The Executive Committee shall convene a Special General Meeting if so required by requisition in writing by at least ten (10) financial members. A quorum for a general meeting shall be fifteen (15).

#### 7. DISPUTES AND MEDIATION

- a. The grievance procedure set out in this rule applies to disputes under these rules between:
  - 1. A member and another member or
  - 2. A member and the Society.
- b. The parties to this dispute must meet and discuss the matter in dispute and, if possible, resolve the dispute within 14 days after the dispute comes to the attention of all the parties.
- c. If the parties are unable to resolve the dispute at the meeting, or if a party fails to attend the meeting, then the parties must, within 10 days, hold a meeting in the presence of a mediator.
- d. The mediator must be:
  - 1. A person chosen by agreement between the parties; or
  - 2. In the absence of agreement:
  - (i) in the case of a dispute between a member and another member, a person appointed by the committee of the Society, or
  - (ii) in the case of a dispute between member and the Society, a person who is a mediator appointed or employed by the Dispute Settlement Centre of Victoria (Department of Justice).
- e. A member of the Society can be a mediator.
- f. The mediator cannot be a member who is party to the dispute.
- g. The parties to the dispute must, in good faith, attempt to settle the dispute by mediation.

- h. The mediator, in conducting the mediation must:
  - 1. Give the parties to the mediation process every opportunity to be heard; and
  - 2. Allow due consideration by all parties of any written statement submitted by any party; and
  - 3. Ensure that natural justice is accorded to the parties to the dispute throughout the mediation process.
- i. The mediator must not determine the dispute.

If the mediation process does not result in the dispute being resolved, the parties may seek to resolve the dispute in accordance with the act, otherwise at law.

# 8. AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

The constitution may be amended only at a General Meeting of which at least fourteen (14) days notice in writing shall have been given to members. A proposed amendment to the constitution shall be submitted in writing to the Secretary and shall require to be supported in writing by at least five (5) financial members.

#### 9. AUDIT

Accounts shall be kept of all monies received and expended by the Society. An auditor who shall not be a member of the Executive Committee and who may or may not be a member of the Society shall be appointed annually at the Annual General Meeting and shall be eligible for reselection. A statement showing the financial position of the Society examined and certified by the auditor shall be laid before the Annual General Meeting.

#### 10. BY-LAWS

The Society shall compile such by-laws and/or standing orders as may be desirable for the operations of the Society.

#### **BY-LAWS**

#### **Honorary membership of WSV**

- 1. The person shall have served on the committee for a minimum of six (6) years and/or shall have been active in promoting or executing weed control activities over at least a fifteen (15) year period.
- 2. The person must be widely recognized as a leader in weed control matters over an extended period and/or for at least fifteen (15) years prior to the nomination. Honorary membership should be viewed as something of distinction, and only bestowed on active weed control persons who have interstate, national and preferably international standing.
- 3. There shall only be five honorary members at any one time, unless the committee deems otherwise through extraordinary circumstances.
- 4. All nominations with justifications seconded by two people are to be in writing. The nominators must be financial members of the Society. The committee's decision is final.
